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LOOKING BACK

During the last calendar year, the Board has made notable progress toward building the necessary infrastructure for our organization. Under the direction of our executive director and with the support of our administrator we have:

- Appointed an Examination Review Task Force to assemble a new test form for the CCA examination.
- Appointed an Eligibility Task Force to address the initial standards for CCA certification.
- Created and adopted policy regarding Standing Committees. Appointed the Credentials Committee who is responsible for the evaluation and authorization of all CCA certification applications.
- Increased our membership, welcoming five (5) new certificants to the BCCA.
- Retained six (6) certificants who successfully fulfilled the standards of maintenance requirements for certification.
- Created and adopted new certification policies and procedures, including but not limited to:
 - Confidentiality
 - Special Testing Requests
 - Code of Ethics and Standards of Practice
 - Disciplinary & Complaints
 - Eligibility
 - Clinical Supervision
 - Supervisors
 - Retired Status

LOOKING AHEAD

Board members have listened to colleagues and engaged in robust discussions throughout the year to address eligibility criteria for the CCA certification program.

In 2014, the Eligibility Task Force was established as an ad hoc task force to address the initial standards for CCA certification. This encompassed currency issues pertinent to anaplastology training programs, applicant experience, clinical supervision, and academic coursework. The task force was involved in

recurring web conferencing sessions over a period of eight (8) months. Beginning August 2014, at the regular meetings of the Board of Directors, members of the Board began to review and discuss the proposed Eligibility, Clinical Supervision, and Supervisor policies and procedures.

The Board of Directors has developed a revised document that includes clarification and expansion of the current eligibility criteria as well as some significant changes that will impact candidates considering certification through the BCCA.

The Board will be asking our membership for input via survey. Please give the proposed policies careful consideration and take the time to respond accordingly.

This coming year, we will also focus on:


- Completion of the BCCA Policies and Procedures Manual. This Manual is established to further describe standard methods and protocols that will be followed to better execute the mission of the BCCA.
- Completion of a new Certified Clinical Anaplastology Candidate Handbook. The CCA Candidate Handbook will provide information essential to the certification process from application through test taking to recertification.
- Completion and launch of a thorough redesign of our website. The new site will provide easier navigation, and include a variety of updated features and information that will help candidates and other stakeholders learn more about the organization, industry, and certification program.

On behalf of the Board we congratulate and welcome our new members. We thank all BCCA members for their dedication to the BCCA and quality patient care.

Anaplastology is a profession with deep historical roots in rehabilitative medicine. For decades anaplastologists have provided reconstructive prostheses and other custom medical devices which required extra attention to esthetic design and appearance. Advancements in patient care over the last 20 years have increased the need for a dedicated level of clinical and technical skill necessary to conduct safe and effective anaplastology practice in conjunction with emerging technologies and a higher expectation of quality care. Anaplastologists work in a variety of practice settings utilizing a unique skill set to create

innovations in anaplastology and advance quality patient care.

In 1980, Walter Spohn and colleagues founded the American Anaplastology Association (AAA) at Stanford University Medical Center, in Palo Alto, California. Mr. Spohn wanted the AAA to serve as an open and inspiring "Information Exchange," welcoming all of the multidisciplinary specialists involved in prosthetic rehabilitation, and to promote coordination and communication among professionals working along different but related paths in the service of the patient.

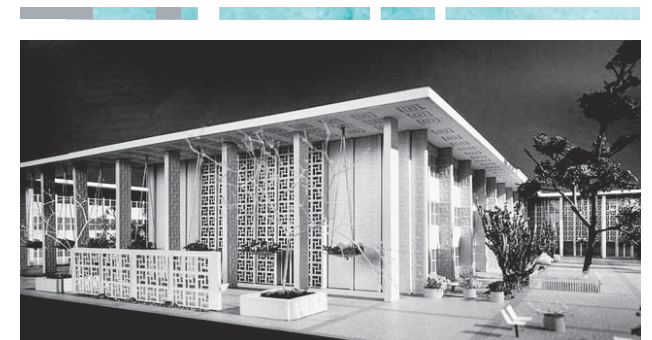
At the recommendation of an advisory committee formed in 1997, the membership of the American Anaplastology Association voted to establish a certification board in 2000 to follow the guidelines of the National Commission for Certifying Agencies (NCCA) — the accrediting body for the agency currently known as the Institute for Credentialing Excellence (ICE). This certification board became the Board for Certification in Clinical Anaplastology (BCCA).

In 2002, the Board for Certification in Clinical Anaplastology was established as a private,

autonomous organization and incorporated in the state of South Carolina as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit mutual benefit corporation.

In 2008, the American Anaplastology Association voted to change the name of the organization to the International Anaplastology Association (IAA) in recognition of the emerging global profession of clinical anaplastology.

The Board for Certification in Clinical Anaplastology and the International Anaplastology Association remain strategic partners working together to achieve objectives that are mutually beneficially for the field of anaplastology.

PURPOSE

Established in 2002, the Board for Certification in Clinical Anaplastology (BCCA) develops and delivers a certification program in clinical anaplastology (Certified Clinical Anaplastologist) to ensure competence in the field of anaplastology and to promote the enhancement of patient care and professional practice in the field of anaplastology.

MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of the Board for Certification in Clinical Anaplastology is to promote and provide certification in clinical anaplastology for the enhancement of patient care and professional practice.

VISION

The vision of the Board for Certification in Clinical Anaplastology is to be recognized as the leader in clinical anaplastology credentialing.



The Board continuously strives to have sufficient and adequate financial resources to conduct effective certification and recertification program activities. The revenue generated by the BCCA certification program is used to support certification and recertification activities, as well as Board operations.

The BCCA operates in a predictable fiscal environment where expenditures are controlled and, in good times, a reasonable portion of the corporation's revenues shall be put aside in reserves for significant certification expenditures (e.g. job analysis). The Board regularly evaluates its fixed assets and proactively sets aside sufficient funds to facilitate maintaining and enhancing the BCCA's fixed assets to fulfill its mission.

The BCCA has developed requirements for eligibility to ensure that the application process is fair and impartial for all applicants. Each eligibility requirement has been established to ensure that individuals certified by the BCCA have attained an acceptable level of knowledge and proficiency needed to provide safe and effective clinical anaplastology services. In establishing these requirements, the Board acknowledges that a combination of education, clinical experience and demonstrated knowledge are essential for individuals earning the CCA credential.

Candidates cannot earn certification without passing the certification examination and attesting to the BCCA Code of Conduct.

BCCA supports the ongoing professional development of its certificants. The mandatory recertification process provides certificants with the opportunity to demonstrate the retention, reinforcement and expansion of their knowledge and skills pertaining to new clinical advances as well as state of the art information over the full spectrum of clinical anaplastology. Recertification also provides encouragement to, and acknowledgement for, participation in ongoing professional development activities and lifelong learning. To support this purpose, the recertification requirements require continuing education and professional activities that enhance ongoing professional development, recognize learning opportunities, promote continuing competence, and provide a process for both attaining and recording professional development achievements.

To remain in good standing, certificants are required to remit annual fees, recertify every five (5) years with continuing education, and attest to the BCCA Code of Conduct.

NEWLY CERTIFIED

The Board for Certification in Clinical Anaplastology offered the CCA examination on May 27, 2014, in concurrence with the International Anaplastology Association's 28th Annual Educational Conference in Denver, Colorado. Candidates who successfully met all eligibility requirements, including passing of the examination, received official certificates and are now authorized to use the CCA® credential in all correspondence and professional relations. The Board of Directors congratulates and welcomes our five newly credentialed members.

NEWLY RECERTIFIED

Six (6) certificants, initially certified in 2009, successfully maintained the annual fees and fulfilled the standards of maintenance requirements for certification. Certificants received a series of recertification email reminders in which instruction was provided to report and submit continuing education units via the online CCA Recertification Application. All newly recertified certified clinical anaplastologists were issued a new certificate.

As of December 2014, there were 33 CCAs (87%) living in the United States, and three CCAs (8%) living in Canada. Five percent of the CCAs resided internationally, including France and Dubai. CCAs in the USA REGIONS

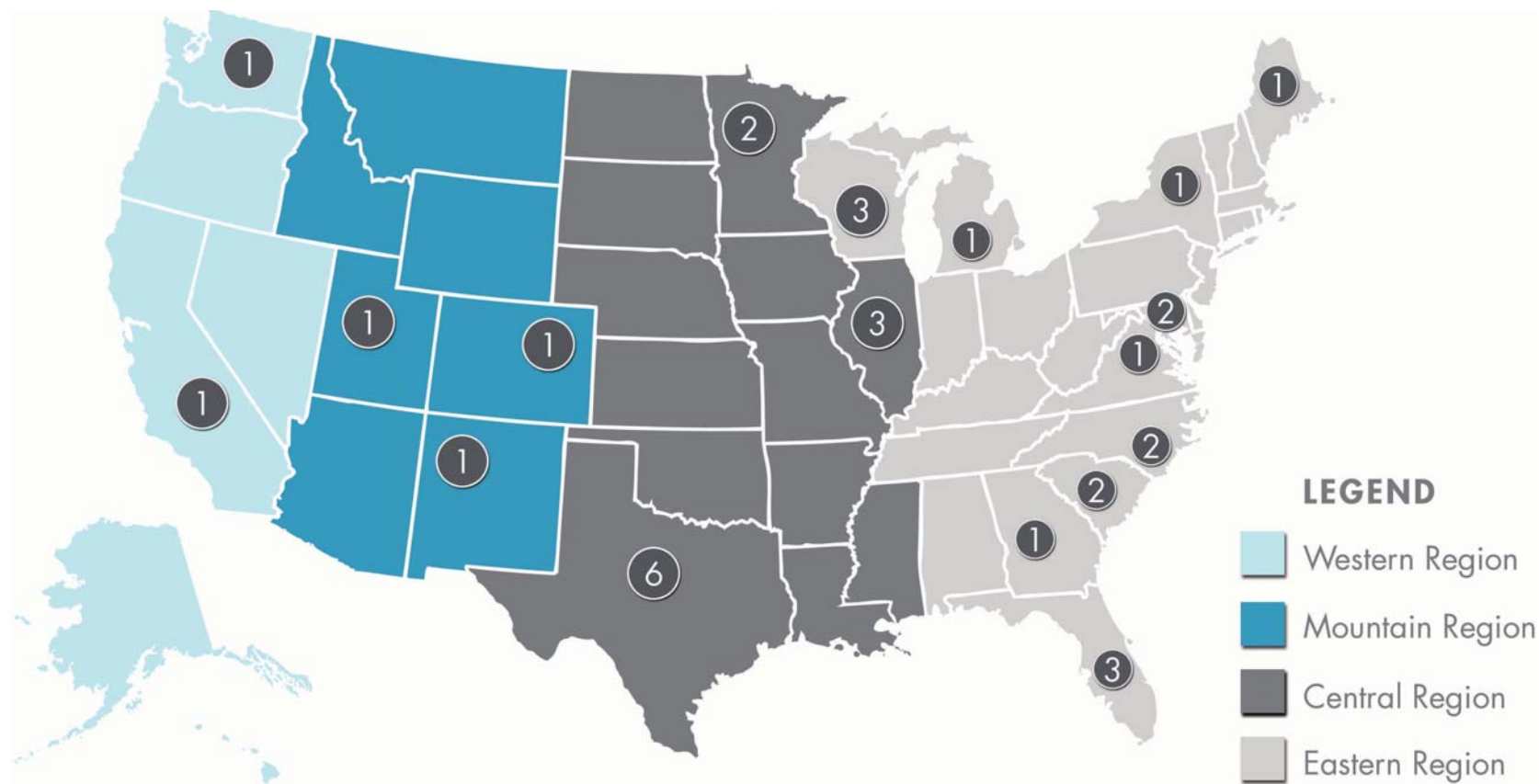


Figure 1. Certified clinical anaplastologists distributed across the four regions of the United States of America.
